SRI LANKA Pop. 21 Mil. Colombo

The believers in the Alankulam assembly were among the many that were affected during the current curfew that has been in place since March because of the coronavirus pandemic. They reported that since most of the assembly consists of daily paid workers who have been unable to go out to work, it has been very difficult to obtain food. They have been allowed out of their homes once a week for around 6 hours to go out and get food but they say that since there is a ban on district to district travel within the island, food stocks have not been arriving on the East coast of the island. When they do go to the shops on the day that the curfew is lifted, there have been long queues which involve a four-hour wait to get into the shops and then only to find that the shops have very little food items for sale mostly things that they do not need.

The believers in the Muttuchenai area, reported that the authorities had set up a road block at the bridge over the Verugal river. Several of the believers and their family members were on one side of the bridge and several were on the other side of the bridge. The bridge marks the dividing point between the Batticaloa district and the Trincomalee district in Eastern Sri Lanka. To stop the spread of the coronavirus, the government has banned district to district travel and as a result they were unable to meet their fellow believers and relations who lived a few hundred metres on the other side of the river.

SRI LANKA Pop. 21 Mil. Writing from N Ireland

The believers in the Vaddavan assembly have also been going through a similar experience. Brother Laxmanan reported that in addition to the lack of food, the East Coast of the island has had no rain for several months. In their village they have the only water-well that produces uncontaminated water. About 40 families come to their home each morning to collect water from their well. This combination of lack of food and drinking water has resulted in tremendous hardship for the believers in that area over the last couple of months.

The believers in Badureliya are also facing great hardship at present. Many are daily paid workers on tea and rubber estates in that area. They have also been without jobs for the last two months and as a result have not been able to feed their families. Brother Sumith and his family have been a great help to them at this time and have been helping them by purchasing food and various provisions and helping those who were starving. Please pray for Sumith and his family as they serve the Lord despite facing great hardship.

The virus is now entering the informal housing areas causing the infection and death rates to dramatically increase. Although officially there are 100,000 confirmed cases and 2,000 deaths, the actual number is probably much higher. Over half of all cases are in the Cape Town area. One believer in one of the Cape Town assemblies has already died and another is seriously ill in hospital. The lockdown has also had very severe consequences in terms of poverty and hunger. The government expects the unemployment rate to be 50% by the end of the pandemic. Some believers have zero household income as a result. The peak of the virus is not expected to come until August or September God willing.

NEPAL Pop. 29 Mil. Gantok

A few younger sisters here have started an online weekly Sunday School program through Zoom. The response has been tremendous with children from all over Nepal, Siliguri, Sikkim and as far away as Brunei (near Malaysia) attending. Most of our sisters are first generation Christians and have never attended Sunday School themselves, so they are learning and being encouraged at the same time.

The assembly has been blessed with online 'visits' from a number of brethren from the UK, US and Canada. Due to our remote location we do not have a lot of visitors (apart from the blessing of Charles who comes regularly!) – so this has been very refreshing for our believers. Again, these meetings are being attended by believers from all over Nepal and other nearby countries.

Prayer Requests:

- Do remember our daily wage believers for whom this lockdown is very difficult financially. Close to half of Gangtok assembly are taxi drivers and they are highly dependent on the tourism industry which has been completely shut down at present. In other parts

of West Bengal, assemblies are made up of tea garden workers who are also without income at present.

- Literature work – for the Lord’s rich blessing on this labour.
- For the Lord’s continued direction in the Sunday School work.
- For students who are struggling with online classes – many of our children are not very strong academically as it is. With poor internet and at times, lack of motivation on the part of teachers, their studies are really suffering which is discouraging for them.
- For good internet – we are so dependent now on the internet for everything – meetings, outreach, studies, etc. and this can be a great problem at times.

The health system has been in crisis for many years. The hospitals are in a deplorable state. Most are without water, ICU units are contaminated. Apparently, 70% our doctors have left the country for better alternatives. Whether among Christians or the general population, poverty reigns! People are so poor and prices are soaring from day to day. Please pray for Venezuela.
